15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

College of Vocational Studies is a unique institution as it offers a combination of job-oriented vocational courses and traditional Honors courses. The pattern of the CBCS and LOCF syllabi ensured that a multidisciplinary approach already existed in the academic structure. Therefore, the college has a vision of following the path of multi-disciplinary education by offering the students adequate options to study different courses during the implementation of the NEP structure from November 2022. The new framework will be

implemented shortly and will ensure that a student of B.Sc. (H) Computer Science can also study a DSC paper of English and vice versa. As far as following a holistic vision is concerned, the college has a thriving cultural and social environment because of the many student societies.

The Humanities graduates from English and History can opt for the Generic Elective in Maths. The Economics undergraduates in the college study Statistics and Maths as part of their core curriculum. They are also taught compulsory courses on Data Analysis and programming language in 2nd year. Similarly, students in the Computer Science department receive practical know-how in JAVA, C++ and Python as part of their syllabus in the computer lab.

Within the existing framework of Delhi University curriculum, there is a compulsory course in Environmental Science for all the students. Besides academic activities, the college provides various avenues to the students for community engagement and services, environmental education and attaining values, through college societies such as NSS, Green Brigade (environment society) and Aaghaaz (Women Development Cell). The innovative activities and events organized by these societies play an important role in facilitating a holistic and multidisciplinary education.

The NEP framework will ensure that the students, at each point in their degrees (diploma/certificate/hons), are well-prepared to enter the outside world. The multiple entry and exit option will prove to be especially beneficial for students who earlier had to drop out of the course due to financial constraints. Once the students exit after one, two or three years of study, they have the option to resume their studies at a later date as per their own convenience.

Aaghaz, the Women's development cell undertakes research on women's issues and Enactus focuses on socially relevant research. Innovative community engagement is the aim of the Vocational projects.

Last but not the least, there is a healthy academic atmosphere in the college and a number of our faculty members are involved in their doctoral research.

The College of Vocational Studies has been following an interdisciplinary approach. The CBCS structure with the LOCF includes a Generic elective option which lets a student of Commerce study a subject like Women Empowerment offered by the department of English. This unique combination of a variety of subjects allows a healthy flow of information and academic plurality.

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CVS is a constituent college of the University of Delhi and follows the guidelines prescribed by the University administration.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

College of Vocational Studies aims to provide multidisciplinary and holistic development to its students through its range of both vocational and traditional honours courses. This presents the students with an opportunity to experience an integrated method of learning. The Academic Bank of Credits, proposed by NEP 2020, will further enhance this experience by making it more flexible, collaborative and effective. The students will have the options to choose from a variety of Discipline-centric courses, Generic Elective courses, Skill Enhancement courses, and Value-added courses. They will also be able to access their Academic bank accounts for credit accumulation, credit transfer and credit redemption. This will be extremely helpful to strengthen their sense of autonomy in choosing and learning their desired courses in the Higher Education Institutions of their choice. Being a constitutent college of the University of Delhi, the college looks forward to receiving further guidelines so that the framework proposed by NEP 2022 regarding the Academic Bank of Credit can be implemented at the earliest. The College of Vocational Studies will get registered under ABC upon receiving the official notifications from the university.

The college plans to participate in student and faculty exchange programmes in order to expand its association with other teaching institutions. We also intend to broaden our resources and encourage collaborative research. In continuation of such efforts, the College of Vocational Studies has already signed MOUs with two foreign universities recently with the University of Macerata, Italy and the University of Uzbekistan. With CBCS and LOCF, the current curriculum of the college follows a multidisciplinary approach towards teachinglearning processes. The teachers are encouraged to develop fresh and interactive pedagogical methods to offer better conceptual clarity and practical experience to the students. The assessments are designed to gauge all-round development of the students as opposed to just limiting the evaluation process to the mechanical memorization of key concepts. The internal assessments also employ a wide range of assessment techniques which include assignments, tests, presentations, quizzes, group activities, projects, etc, which also indirectly lead to better in-class engagement. Many of the college faculty are also members of the syllabus revision committee at the university level.

ABC aims to enable a better integration of multiple disciplines and cultivate a culture of creativity, innovation and desired learning outcomes. College of Vocational Studies, by blending both traditional honours courses and job-based vocational courses, provides a conducive environment for the desired integration. At each step of their academic journey (certificate/diploma/degree), the students get various options from elective courses that contribute to broadening their horizons.

The NEP 2020 has been implemented by the college and the provisions regarding Academic Bank of Credits are being followed.

17.Skill development:

College of Vocational Studies (CVS) is one of the few educational institutions which offers vocational education and soft skills degree programmes. These courses are in line with the National Skills Qualifications Framework, wherein the courses have been designed to cater to the demands of current business professions. The vocational degrees are job and skill oriented, in which graduates can either pursue careers in their related vocation or other jobs in the government and private sector. CVS offers seven vocational degree programmes: 1) B.A. (VS) Human Resource Management, 2) B.A. (VS) Marketing Management and Retail Business, 3) B.A. (VS) Tourism Management, 4) B.A. (VS) Management and Marketing of Insurance 5) B.A. (VS) Office Management and Secretarial Practice, 6) B.A. (VS) Small and Medium Enterprises, and 7) B.A. (VS) Materials Management. These programs are designed to provide knowledge and skills in their respective vocation, along with basic business courses like accounting and communications. Apart from this, CVS also provides conventional Honours UG programmes in Economics, History, Computer Science, Commerce, English, Hindi, Business Economics and Bachelor of Management Studies.

The college also inculcates humanistic, ethical, Constitutional and human values through various societies such as the environment society, NSS and the women's development cell.

In the 1st two semesters, students are taught the fundamentals of their respective vocational program to ensure a strong foundation in their course discipline, through core disciplines and Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC). In the 3rd and 4th semester, along with the core discipline, students are taught Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) in which they learn computer and communication skills. In the 5th and 6th semester, elective core

courses are taught. CVS provides not only classroom-based education, it encourages its students to be part of extracurricular activities through participation in various societies, sports, competitions, national and international events, and internships. The entire course of a particular vocational education is related to a specific business profession. Students from other conventional programs can opt for a specific discipline through Discipline Specific Electives (DSE) in the last year of the program.

Industry experts are occasionally invited by the College to share their knowledge, experience, and provide career guidance to the students through workshops and seminars. Currently, vocational courses are offered on-campus only. The college is not associated with National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC). Skilling courses in soft skills, such as computers and communications, and stenography, are being offered only on-campus. From the year 2022 onwards, CVS is adopting the New Education Policy 2020 (NEP 2020) in all its courses including the vocational courses, to ensure a broader knowledge and skills development of students by offering a broad range of SEC and AECC from the 1st semester itself. With the implementation of NEP 2020's multiple exit scheme, the vocational courses aim to provide the students with adequate level of knowledge and skills in their respective vocations, to ensure higher chances for employment if the student chooses to exit before the completion of the four-year vocational degree program.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The College of Vocational studies has always been dedicated towards engaging its students and faculty members with Indian knowledge systems through academic and extracurricular activities. These engagements reflect institutional preparedness for NEP. The efforts are reflected in the long-standing collaboration between the cultural society of the college with SPICMACAY which focuses on promotion of Indian Classical Music and Culture amongst Youth. Apart from exposure to Indian performing arts, the college also provides space for organization of theatrical performances like Dastangoi based on Indian realities and history. Academically under the LOCF curriculum, the college offers SEC courses like 'Understanding Popular Culture' and 'Indian Art and Architecture' offered by the Department of History, and GE courses like 'Cultures in the Indian Subcontinent' offered by BA (VS) Tourism management. All these courses are taught bilingually. Moreover, GE courses like 'Readings' in Indian Diversities and Literary Movements', 'Language, Literature, and Culture', and 'Text and Performance: Indian

Performance Theories and Practices' offered by the English Department focus on introducing students from various honours courses to Indian Literatures (both Classical and Vernacular) and the Indian aesthetic and performance theories. The institution offers B.A (H) Hindi which is taught in Hindi and courses like B.A (VS) Tourism and B.A (H) History are taught bilingually. To promote dialogue and discussion on topics pertaining to Indian culture The Department of English and the IQAC organized an online speaker session on 'University in Diversity: Catchphrase or Creed' on September 17, 2021. The guest Speaker Dr. Hina Nandrajog employed a multidisciplinary approach to investigate the ways in which diversity of the Indian subcontinent manifests itself through its architecture, folklore, stories, and other modes of cultural expressions. The lecture also emphasized the significance of translation in facilitating dialogue between various vernacular cultures of India which would empower unity among diversities. The national conference organized by the English Department and the IQAC on 'Revisiting Subcontinental Partitions' was also aimed at highlighting the need of a continuous critical engagement with Indian history and heterogeneous cultural responses to it. The institution organizes such events every year in order to encourage students and faculty members to expand the horizon of their knowledge and pedagogical strategies with regards to disciplines surrounding Indian languages and culture. The institution encourages its faculty members to participate in academic programmes and workshops in order to enhance and update their skill and knowledge repertoire of Indian knowledge systems. In the last year faculty members participated in lectures and workshops on topics ranging from Indian folklore, vernacular literature, and Indian tourism in the post-pandemic era. It can be said that the institution has already started building a foundation on which the NEP's aim to promote and integrate Indian knowledge systems can easily be assimilated.

Under the NEP, Twenty four Value Addition courses have been introduced and many of them are based on Indian Knowledge system, such as, Vedic Mathematics, Indian Fiction in English, Ayurveda, Yoga, Art of Living, etc.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The institution already follows the Learning Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) prescribed by University of Delhi. In this framework, the curriculum has been designed with primary focus on outcomes-based education which enables the teaching-learning process to be student centric. All departments of the institution

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follow their syllabi in which desired learning outcomes of each paper in every course are clearly delineated along with a detailed teaching plan. Faculty members also create, in addition, their own teaching plans to supplement this for each academic year and in order to streamline lectures. Thereby the institution strives to more effectively meet the learning outcomes of a specific paper. At the very outset, students are informed of what a specific course or paper aims to achieve and what they can expect to learn from it. The objective is to provide clarity so that the students can choose wisely. This also emphasizes the student-centric nature of our classrooms and overall education. The institution also conducts regular internal assessment in the form of assignments and tests. Students receive detailed feedback on their performance keeping the specific learning outcomes of the programme in mind. The assessment is done in order to align learning objectives with performance objectives. In this academic year, the college has also conducted a student satisfaction survey wherein students were asked to record their inputs with regard to focus on expected competencies of faculty members and course outcomes. The college also focuses on enhancement of skills which would prepare the students for industries and professional spaces. For this, the college regularly organizes workshops, events, field visits, and industry trips. For instance, B.A. (VS) Tourism organized a heritage walk for its students on December 5, 2021. In addition, ASPIRE which is the student placement cell of the college works as a bridge between the institution and industry. The cell organizes alumni meets, training workshops, and interactive sessions with industry leaders to augment the students' learning experience as well as align classroom teaching with needs of the industry. On September 22, 2021, ASPIRE invited Dr. Arvind Shukla who is the Chairperson of Doctoral Programmes and Professor of Marketing at BIMTECH to interact with the students. All departments are encouraged by the institution to invite experts to speak on topics pertaining to their prescribed syllabi. This ensures that students are acquainted with multiple points-of-view on a given topic and attain an in-depth knowledge of the subject. To holistically meet all these requirements, the vision and mission statements of the college provide assurance of wellgrounded theoretical knowledge of disciplines to the students and ensure that students are well equipped with skills that will prepare them to be successful for the current job market.

The courses/syllabus which have been revised under NEP 2020 are also based on Learning Outcome-based approach.

20.Distance education/online education:

The college has the capacity for online education and will follow University guidelines in offering programs in online/distancelearning mode. At present, all courses offered by the college are run in on-campus mode only. Also, the college can take the initiative of offering certificate programmes subject to the approval of the Governing Body. Currently, CVS is equipped with projectors in classrooms, which are used by teachers in presenting their lectures; computer labs for teaching computer skills, a conference and seminar room equipped with projector and sound system for conducting conferences, seminars and workshops. The University provided MS-teams online platform for online classes and also conducted Webinars during the pandemic. As learning shifted online, teachers adopted innovative strategies and digital resources to educate and assess students. Ordinarily, both the library and computer lab allow students to use Personal Computers and become technically literate and learn on their own. Students of courses such as Computer Science use the computers in the computer lab to apply and practice the training, they receive in programming languages. Students from other courses, too, are taught and encouraged to use digital resources to facilitate learning. The NEP will encourage universities to introduce online, distance and hybrid formats for imparting education. Thus, we can expect multidisciplinary and holistic education to be accessible to people across the nation. Students will no longer be bound by their location and can access educational resources as per their convenience no matter where they are. Thus, this model will improve both flexibility and accessibility of the educational programmes. The distance mode will prove beneficial for students who are unable to finance their education as they will be able to opt for the distance format which is already available in the University of Delhi via Non-Collegiate Women's Education Board and School of Open Learning. The distance format allows students to work while they study and considerably ameliorates the stress they experience.

The college is running School of Open Learning (SOL) courses in distance mode since SOL study centre is operational in the college.

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

College of Vocational Studies is a constituent college of University of Delhi. It was founded in 1972. CVS is distinct as it emphasises on skill-building by offering a variety of vocational courses to students.

CVS follows a pre-determined syllabus set by the University for all the traditional courses offered such as B. Com (Hons.), B.A. (Hons) History, B.A. (Hons) Economics, B.Sc (Hons) Computer Science, B.A.(Hons) Business Economics, B.A.(Hons) English, B.A. (hons) Hindi and Bachelor of Management Studies (BMS).

The seven vocational courses are MMI-Management and Marketing of Insurance, MMRB-Marketing Management and Retail Business, Tourism Management, OMSP-Office Management and Secretarial Practice, SME-Small and Medium Enterprises, HRM-Human Resource Management and MM-Material Management. The syllabus of Vocational courses is designed by the college and approved by the University.

Additionally, CVS also offers courses in French and German Language and Post-graduate diploma in Tourism and Book Publishing.

The classes, practicals and tutorials are scheduled as per course-wise time-table prepared by the college Time Table committee and the same is uploaded online on CVS website [www.cvs.edu.in]. This gives students easy access to their time-tables and helps in smooth conduct of classes. Department wise and teachers' time-table are also prepared in the beginning of the academic session. Attached herewith are the timetables (course/department wise or faculty wise) for the years 2021-22. The teaching-plans of the faculty members are uploaded on the college website for 2021-22.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

Being an affiliated college, the college adheres to the academic calendar prepared by the University. This calendar provides the schedule to be followed for classes, conduct of practical examination, wherever applicable, and the conduct of theory examination towards the end of each semester.

For conducting Internal Evaluation, teachers conduct class tests and assignments. Each paper has an internal assessment of 25 marks, out of which 10 marks are for assignments, 10 marks are for internal test and 05 marks are for attendance. The students are also evaluated using other methods such as PowerPoint presentations, projects, group discussions, quiz, etc. The students are given deadlines for assignment submissions while dates for class tests and presentations are announced well in advance.

The college academic calendar also incorporates the conduct of various cultural and extra-curricular activities, conduct of seminars, special lectures, organising of annual day, sports day and celebration of other national festivals.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Along with imparting education, the Collegebelieves in transforming students into sensitive, value-enriched, ethical and compassionate human beings.

The college has societies like the Woman Development Cell- Aghaaz and Internal Complaint Committee address and sensitize students on the aspects of gender equality. Green Brigade society with its tree plantation drive, zero waste campaigning, e-waste recycling runawareness programmes to educate students on environmental problems.

Academically, AECC courses, Discipline center elective courses and

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Generic elective courses provide critical analysis on Gender, Human values, ethics and environmental -related issues.

Field visits are mandatory for AECC on Environmental Studies. The students have visited a number of ecologically sensitive, important places and documented environmental damage with the help of short movies and documentaries.

Commerce has core papers Business Laws, Corporate Laws, Human Right Management which addresses Professional Ethics.

Economics has courses Environmental Economics addressing environmental issues. Core papers like Development economics, Indian economy caters to issues of inequality and Human Capital formation.

English offers course on woman empowerment, women writing and applied gender studies.

History has courses History of India addressingthe issues Human values

Labour and Development in Indiain BA (Vocational) course discusses the gender inequalities in labour market.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Teachers assess students' learning levels in the classrooms during lectures and through the execution of class quizzes, assignments, tutorials, and other activities, based on which slow and advanced learners are identified. Following that, specific teaching-learning strategies tailored to the needs of such students are discussed and put into practise. There is a separate students' advocacy cell - "MANAS" to deal with the academic and the physical challenges.

Our faculty members use an integrated approach in their classes. To make learning more engaging and relatable, traditional teaching methods are supplemented by new generation technological tools.

Slow Learners:

Tutorials and remedial classes are organized for weak students to provide additional support. There are Mentor-Mentee groups formed for all the students. Other measures includes providingadditional reading material and books, e-links forbetter understanding of the subject, bilingual explanations and debates, counselling for personal, academic, and career issues, homeassignments, additional tests, group discussions and presentations.

Advanced Learners:

Teachersmeasure the potentialsof the students and identify advanced learners during lectures, tutorials, class assessments, assignments, and outside-of-class engagement, combination of academic and co-curricular activities, intercollegiate tournaments, advanced readings recommended in relevant topics, group discussions and presentations, Cash awards, medals, appreciation certificates, and scholarships. The Inflibnet service and other e-resources connected to Delhi University are available at the College library to assist advanced learners in expanding their horizons.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

- 2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences
- All Departments have adopted innovative student centric methods to enhance and enrich the learning process for the students. Some of the methods employed by the college in this process are:

Classroom lectures are held in interactive mode, allowing students to engage in meaningful discussions, thereby converting a typical classroom into a space for knowledge enhancement. Students are encouraged to engage in self-motivated, problem-solving approaches to sensitize them towards practical utility of their knowledge. Group discussions are held at the class level to foster the skills of spontaneous thinking and communicative ability in the students. Guest lectures and interactive sessions with eminent academicians and experts from diverse fields are held from time to time to develop the learning skills of the students.

In participative learning, the students are given certain topics which are of utmost importance both academically and practically, they are then divided into groups and asked to read various articles or write ups and then to analyse and draw conclusions. Students undertake group activities such as project assignments, case-study analysis which leads to participative learning. Faculty use ICT enabled classrooms and wi-fi facilities for student centric learning through power-point presentations, elearning platforms and deployment of other innovative programme media.

Out of the total lectures that are delivered for a course, at least thirty percent or depending upon the requirement lectures are delivered based on ICT enabled tools and resources. The internal evaluation is done in a continuous manner as per university rules. Each paper has an internal assessment of 25 marks, out of which 10 marks are for assignments/presentations, 10 marks for class test and 05 marks for attendance. The evaluation of Internal Assessment in done through: Class Test, Assignments, Power Point Presentations, Project, Case Study, Group Discussions

Schedule of class tests and assignments is provided well in advance and is displayed on the departments' notice board. In case of online classes, a notification is sent to the mail ids of all the students on MS Teams. Tests and assignments are shared and submitted on MS TEAMS/ Google classrooms/ emails/ Meet.

Evaluation method comprises internal examinations held progressively during the semester and is designed to check and report the periodic performance of the students. Also, if any student by any chance has missed his class test is given another chance to reappear and submit the same.

All the records including attendance in internal Examinations, Question papers, valued answer sheets/copies, summary of marks sheets, are properly maintained by the teachers for academic monitoring/academic audit.

There is complete transparency in the internal assessment. After evaluation, marks are shared by faculty members.

In order to ensure transparency and to take care of internal assessment related grievances, there is a moderation committees and monitoring committee.

The College of Vocational Studies provides an ICT-enabled teaching and learning infrastructure which also supports differently-abled students. College has a well-designed architecture with information technology, as well as the high quality standards of upkeep, in order to disseminate excellent education and a complete teaching-learning exposure to its students and faculty. The College campus is spread in 40357.7 sq. m. of area including playground, pathways, parking and lawns. The classrooms, conference room, seminar room, committee room, and library are all spacious and well-equipped. The College has 2 air conditioned computer labs with a total of more than 78 LAN connected desktop computers. The College has allocated separate spaces for cultural

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and Sports activities. The Institution has a well-stocked, fully computerized and air-conditioned library with separate reading areas for the students and teachers. The library has subscriptions to various e-resources. The College is linked to the National Knowledge Network (Government of India) through the University of Delhi.

In the aftermath of the Covid-19 lockdown, the College encouraged online platform for teaching learning. The college adopted MS-Teams as the official platform for online teaching, enabling enriched teacher-student interactive interface. The institution has a robust student-computer ratio of 5:1.

6.1 - Institutional Vision and Leadership

The college as per its vision and mission aims to provide good

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education along with proper facilities for all-round development of the students. The college has well-qualified teachers and a good infrastructure to encourage and facilitate innovation, research, and extra-curricular activities. The institution run through a decentralized and participative management. All the major decisions are taken by the Governing Body, which has two teacher representatives, one non-teaching representative and two university appointed members along with the Principal and the Chairman. The Staff Council consisting of all the teachers (headed by Principal), takes the other academic and administrative decisions of the college. There are 20 Committees whose conveners are chosen as per seniority and by consent, to look after the various aspects of administration. 6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/perspective plan is effectively deployed

The college was engaged infrastructural development as a part of deployment of strategic plan and its successful implementation. The purpose was to accommodate growing academic needs of the students. Viva Associates were selected for the construction of this new building. The plan comprises of construction of a double storey building in prefabricated insulated sandwiched skin in flat cement particle board sheet- asbestos free in W- profile for additional classrooms and toilets. The plan was approved in the building committee meeting held on September 10, 2018.

The two tenders that were received were from M/s Shweta Contractors and the other was from M/s Viva Associates. Since the amount quoted by Viva Associates was the lowest, the Building Committee decided to recommend to the Governing Body for its approval and award of the contract. A payment of 40,00000 /- was made to Viva Associates on 5th May 2022. Subsequent payments were also made from time to time as the work progressed.

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6.2.2 - The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

The institution follows service rules and organisational structure mandated by the university. The Principal acts as the head of both teaching and non-teaching staff. The Governing Body of the college is constituted by the University, making it the highest decisionmaking body of the institution. The duties of the administration are divided and decentralised amongst the two administrative officers who lead the administration and accounts department, respectively, along with the Senior Personal Assistant (SPA). The administrative officers are backed by their Assistants and the work is also delegated to the Caretaker as well as to the Gestetner Operator. Utility staff functions as the last line of service assistance in both these departments. The Principal is further assisted by the Librarian, Teachers-in-charge of the departments, and the Bursar. Further, the Librarian is backed by Assistants and Library Attendants. The functioning of the computer lab is overseen by the TIC of the department of Computer Science, along with the administrative office, and with the assistance of lab attendants. In the case of the teaching staff, the organisational structure is rather simple. The duties are met efficiently through the combined and hierarchical efforts of the Principal, Associate Professors and Assistant Professors.

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issues. An MOU was signed with "Jaagruti waste paper recycling services" to recycle waste paper from the College.

Many activities were held and several initiatives undertaken up in the college to reduce waste production and its management. Composting the garden waste generates manure for the plants. Green Brigade started aninitiative "Waste Management Project" to maintain a clean and green campus. NSS-CVS, took a step to make our campus cleaner and ensured that there should be proper disposal of plastic waste. Moreover, separate bins have been setup for different types of waste in the college.
